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## A QUICK HISTORICAL, POLITICAL, & SOCIAL OVERVIEW

(See Granada and Barcelona for more Spain politics) Madrid was the home of the Republican front during the Spanish civil war. Here many journalists lived and reported on the war between the Republicans against Franco and his army. An interesting fact is that while Gran Vía was being bombed by Franco, the rich area of Salamanca was spared since many of its residents were Franco supporters. Madrid is the capital of Spain having officially designated this in the 1978 constitution, and of the home to headquarters world tourism organization. Madrid was also home to many antiausterity protests in 2011 that were a result of the great financial crisis in 2008. It is also home to a cultural movement in the 1980s called La Movida. The current mayor of the city is José Luiz Martínez-Almeida. Freedom House gives it a score of 90/100 meaning free and EIU gives it a 7.94/10 as a flawed democracy.

## **FOOD & RESTAURANTS**

### **TORTILLA**



Madrid and you are either team con or sin cebolla (with or without onion). I am team con cebolla, but either way the tortilla is delicious. There are many different cafes and restaurants to tortilla but have my personal favorite is Tortilla in Malasaña. It was a block away from my house, so I ate there a decent amount, but expect long lines since it is so popular. Tortilla from the grocery store is not as good but surprisingly no that bad!

## **EMPANADAS**



**Empanadas** are also a popular dish in Madrid, and all over the city you can find stores and restaurants selling them. It is always the perfect snack after class or just if you are feeling a little hungry. My favorite place was Malvon Argentinian Empanadas. I am not lying when I say I probably went here 4 times a week it is that good. They just released a truffle empanada that is one of the best things I have ever had. If you are in Madrid you have to check this place out.

## BURGERS



Looking for a good burger? Juanchos and Goiko are definitely your two best options. I lived above Juanchos and it was always packed. Be prepared to cut your own pizza though because most places that serve pizza in Madrid do not cut your pizzas for you. If pork is your thing they have a lot of Iberia ham on pizzas, but I usually chose the vegetarian pizzas. Either way if you are looking for a good pizza you can find it at either of these places.

## **NIGHTLIFE**

Expect to leave most places around 3-4 on an average night and then 5-6 if its a crazy one.

- ICON (24 hour Subway across the street that saved me many nights)



## BARS

In a money saving/lazy effort I did not go to many bars and would pregame for the club in my apartment. If you are looking for a drink check out really any place in Malasaña they have bars and nice sit down areas all over the neighborhood. For themed bars check out Wall Street and for fancy drinks go to Salmon Guru.









## THINGS TO DO AND SEE

Besides having a bunch of amazing restaurants and arguably the best night life scene in all of Europe, there is so much to do in Madrid during the day as well. From palaces to parks to museums there is literally so much this city has to offer.

## RETIRO PARK



Probably my favorite spot in all of Madrid is Retiro Park. In the middle of the Salamanca neighborhood this giant park has a pond you can rent boats on, a crystal palace to go inside, and so much nature to enjoy the Spanish sun. I would run here when the temperature was not too hot and the views are just remarkable. It is also really to get to from the metro as well as generally walking from anywhere in Madrid. You could spend 4 hours here easily without even realizing.

No this is not the real Mona Lisa, but a replica. It is housed in the Prado museum which is home to a lot of old Spanish art and religious paintings. This museum was founded in 1819 and is home to sculptures and art of famous artists such as Goya and Velasquez. Entrance is free for students with a valid student ID so you really do not have an excuse to not go here. It is really expansive with over 7,000 paintings and 1,000 sculptures that you could spend the whole day walking around and looking. It is part of the Golden Triangle of Art (along with the Reina Sofia Museum and Thyssen-Bornemisza Museum) which is listed as a UNESCO world heritage site. As of 2020, it was the 16th most visited museum in the entire world.

## **PARQUE DE OESTE**



Right by Plaza de España is the Parque de Oeste. It gives great views into the mountains outside of Madrid and also has butterfly garden. It is also home to the Temple of Debod which is an ancient Egyptian temple that was brought to Madrid as part of a campaign to save the monuments of Nubia. This park is smaller than Retiro but you can easily spend an hour or so here looking at the great views outside Madrid and enjoying the sun. There is also a cable car that you can take connected to the park which provides scenic views of the entire city.

## **PLAZA MAYOR**



Dating back to the 15th century, the Plaza Mayor is an iconic destination in Madrid that is right by the Puerta de Sol (center of Madrid). Here expect to find souvenir shops, restaurants, and boutique stores. The plaza has suffered from three fires in 1631, 1670, and 1790. There are apartments in the buildings surrounding the plaza and there are 10 entrances/exits inside with 9 separate gates. Originally it was used as the main market in the city. In December there is a large Christmas market that takes place in Plaza Mayor (I guess some things do not change). It has been multi-purpose hosting soccer games, bullfights, and even executions in the past.

Here is the official resident of the Spanish royal family, but it is now only used for ceremonial purposes and state visits. The royal family moved its residence to a larger place slightly outside the city (honestly I would not want to be in the middle of the city living here either if I was them). The palace is owned by the Spanish State and is built upon the site of a Muslim era fortress that was constructed here during the 9th century (reconquista). It is over 1,000,000 square feet with almost 3,500 rooms making it the largest royal palace in all of Europe (go big or go home!). Some of the artists with paintings in the Prado also have their work displayed here. It is also home to the only Stradivarius string quartet.
